

Are Your Fire Escape Plans Up to Date?

Due to the extreme risks involved, and a need to keep current with our tech-


niques, the Fire Department must train on a regular basis. Our firefighters train every day whether they attend classes, study texts, practice a skill or teach others.

The department as a whole conducts training sessions twice a week, three hours each session. These semi-weekly training sessions allow us the opportunity to practice our firefighting skills while working as a team.

This past month we have been training to cut holes in roofs for ventilation purposes, maintaining our proficiency with our Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA), and safely extricating patients from vehicles involved in accidents. Our hazardous materials technicians also attended a class on radiation detection.

October focused on fire prevention.

Operation EDITH (Exit Drills In The Home) took place on Wednesday, October 8th. Beginning at 7:00 p.m., firefighters drove slowly around town, with lights and sirens on, to see if you were practicing your fire escape plan.



In the event that notification becomes necessary, we are able to enter a message into our computer. It will dial all stored numbers within seconds and deliver the message. A message will be left on your voicemail if you do not answer.

Please provide the information in the format provided here and return it to Village Hall as soon as possible.

You can either mail it, drop it off at the hall, either fire station, the police station, or send it in with your next water bill.

Main Street Improvement Project Update

The Illinois Department of Transportation will be opening bids in Springfield for the Main Street improvement project this winter.

IDOT, rather than the Village of Glenwood, is awarding the bids. IDOT has been charged with administering the 70% federal grant funding the Village of Glenwood secured for this project.

Utility relocations should start in the Spring of 2009 with the majority of the roadway construction being performed during the 2009 summer months.

Building Department Information

The Glenwood Fire Department has recently assumed the responsibilities of the Building Department. The full-time staff of firefighter/paramedics will be handling all inspectional services. Our firefighters recently studied for, and passed, examinations given by the International Code Council (ICC) to become certified as building inspectors.

We continue with our education and familiarization of the ICC codes every day. These standards have been adopted by village ordinance; to better serve the residents and business owners of Glenwood.

Building permits will continue to be issued at the Building Department office in Village Hall. Inspections (residential sale, commercial sale, rental property, new construction, fence construction, deck construction, pool inspections, etc.) can still be scheduled through the Building Department office, in person or by telephone.

Along with the daily scheduled inspections, our firefighters have been conducting routine Property Maintenance Inspections several times a week.

We appreciate the characteristics and nuances that make your home unique, but would like to remind you to maintain your property for the good of our community.

Common property maintenance violations include:

- Grass and weeds in excess of six (6) inches,
- Garbage/rubbish, including yard waste, accumulating on the property,
- Gutters and downspouts clogged and not kept in working order,
- Peeling, flaking and chipped paint on the exterior walls of houses and garages.
- Swimming pools that have been neglected.

Glenwood Organizes ESDA Volunteers

Glenwood has organized an Emergency Services Disaster Agency component of its village-wide emergency response plan. ESDA was once part of the Civil Defence program which originated during the Cold War. It has been reorganized with modern threats in mind, and is now a part of the Department of Homeland Security. Natural disaster response remains part of its duties, in addition to these additional responsibilities.

Fire Chief Kevin Welsh is Director and Randy Glover is the assistant director. Glover has served the village for the past 6 years as a paid-on-call firefighter. He graduated from the fire academy in 2002.

"ESDA isn't full-time service, but it's a great way to contribute to the community," said Welsh.

ESDA volunteers will be mobilized by village-issued pagers activated by ECOM. All village departments may request their assistance. They will respond to pre-designated village facilities in about five minutes.

Training is supplied by the village.

September Floods

The heavy rains experienced by Glenwood in September taxed our emergency services in ways we have not seen in many years. The early and "over the top" response to this crisis provided an excellent outcome for our residents.

Record rainfall caused the Creek to overflow its banks and forced the closure of 187th Street and Glenwood-Chicago Heights Roads. In spite of this, we were able to stave off the majority of flooding in residential properties and only experienced minor flooding in a total of 17 buildings in town.

A Disaster Declaration was placed into effect to ensure that we are eligible for reimbursement if funding becomes available. It will also allow residents affected by the flooding to qualify for funding if it becomes available.

We are now embarking on a long-range planning process to formalize the plans that were utilized during this event. We will also address all of the current system inadequacies that exist to minimize the number of affected residents during future emergencies.

We will be addressing issues such as the cleaning and maintaining of the creeks, the infiltration of rainwater into the sanitary system, illegal hook-ups into the sanitary system, berming the area behind the houses on Park Drive, improving the process for road closures and sandbagging and notification to our residents.

Public Works Notes:


- We have sanitary sewer lines in back yards. Please help us serve you, and allow access to yards. Don't leave your dog(s) out when workers are present. We realize it may be a minor inconvenience, but it is necessary to properly maintain our sewer system.
- Don't cover sanitary manholes. We need to have 24-hour access.
- We will make reasonable attempts to contact affected residents first, but late-night or emergency needs may preclude this.
- We will notify residents of scheduled maintenance and when water will be shut off.
- We're here to restore service as quickly as possible, so we may not be able to notify everyone during an emergency situation.

Yard Waste and Branch Drop-off Discontinued

The branch pick-up program will continue but with the following schedule:


- All residents in the Forest, Original Point & Point, branch pick up will be the 1st Monday of each month.
- The Estates, Manor and Old Glenwood pick-up will be the 2nd Monday of each month.
- Last pick up will be the first Monday & second Monday in October. If your pick up day falls on a holiday, the branches will be picked up the following day.

Village Appoints New Public Works Director

Pat McAneney became Glenwood's Public Works Director in July. He comes to the village with extensive municipal experience.

His most recent experience was with Robinson Engineering, where he worked as a resident project representative. He functioned as a project manager, executed engineers plans, acted as liaison with contractors, and adjusted plans to on-site demands. Pat prides himself on working effectively with the least amount of resources expended.

"I want to continue to provide a high level of service to residents as economically as possible," said McAneney. "I will do my best to meet or exceed resident expectations."

Prior to working with Robinson, he worked with Baxter and Woodman Consulting Engineers to help municipalities develop and expand their utility and roadway infrastructure with Baxter. He also served the Village of Homewood for 12 years in their Public Works Department.

Foreclosure Information

The current state of our economy has put many residents at risk for financial hardship. In the event you have fallen onto hard times, there is help. You need not feel alone or "at the end of your rope." Financial institutions are not interested in taking possession of property because they will then have to maintain it.

There are three main reasons that homeowners fall behind in their mortgage:

- A reduction in income from a significant life altering event
- Failure to understand the terms of their mortgage in the first place
- They were lured into unsustainable mortgages by devious lenders

You need to take the time to thoroughly understand your mortgage and all of its components, get out the papers and read them from top to bottom. Know your rights - ask or research on the internet.

Contact your lender immediately when you realize you are going to fall behind. Do not wait until you fall a payment behind. They will be more than willing to work out

an agreeable solution. You will need to formalize a spending plan to get yourself back on track.

Most of all, do not fall prey to foreclosure scams. If you receive an unsolicited call from someone offering to help you; they probably do not have your best interests at heart.

Illinois State Treasurer Alexi Giannoulias has instituted an educational program to help homeowners in need. More information is available at www.treasurer.il.gov.

You can get assistance in the form of a HUD certified Credit Counselor that is provided free of charge by calling 1-888-995-HOPE, or on the web at www.995hope.org. The Credit Counselor will work with you confidentially to determine a bail out plan and then make the presentation of the plan to your mortgage company.

If you, or another resident that you know of is in need of assistance they can call the Glenwood Fire and Inspectional Services Department for further information on how to begin the process of gaining the support that you need to stay in your home.

District 167 Schools Off to a Smooth Start

All four schools opened with a smooth start to a new year. We appreciate everyone's patience with establishing residency and completing registration forms.

During the week of September 2 students in grades K-8 participated in an Anti-Bullying Campaign to kick off the school year.

We are continuing with our campaign to encourage volunteering in the district. Please consider giving up some time this year to volunteer in your child's school. We have many different opportunities to fit your busy schedule. Research shows that there is a direct correlation between a child's school achievement and the involvement level of their parent/guardian in his/her education.

Last summer I reported to you that the District and three of our schools did not make Adequate Yearly Progress according to the No Child Left Behind Act. Shortly after the Illinois State Board of Education published the final results, a decision was made to rescore all of the tests because of a scoring error.

I am very pleased to be able to report that our academic results on the Illinois State Assessment Test (ISAT) from last spring are much more positive. Hickory Bend School, Longwood Elementary School, and Brookwood Middle School made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) in reading and mathematics. Brookwood Junior High School made AYP in reading.

Vehicle Sticker Enforcement Program

All vehicles registered in the Village must display a valid vehicle sticker. In the past, enforcement of this ordinance relied solely on patrol officers issuing citations. Unfortunately, this process has limitations, and there is no way to ensure all vehicles are in compliance.

I worked with the Illinois Secretary of State's Office recently, and was able to purchase information on all vehicles registered within the 60425 zip code. We will use this information to determine which vehicles are registered within the Village. Once this is completed, those vehicles will be compared to a computerized list of all vehicle stickers purchased from Village Hall.

Vehicles found to be registered within the Village, but have not purchased a vehicle sticker, will be sent a summons outlining the violation and providing a hearing date. A letter will be sent with the summons. It will explain how to obtain a vehicle sticker and pay a fine in lieu of attending the hearing.

Directed Patrol Activity


The detective unit is doing a great job mapping out "hot spots" within the Village. These efforts, along with information gathered from residents, are quickly identifying areas which need more police attention. This information has been given to patrol units, the Network #3 Tactical Unit, S.A.F.E Unit, and in some cases, the Building Department.

The Network #3 Tactical Unit is comprised of officers from eight surrounding municipalities who work a couple of nights a month and target "hot spots" in those municipalities.

S.A.F.E. is an acronym for Selective Area Field Enforcement. This is a new unit that consists of specially trained Officers who will also aid in gathering information and for carefully directed enforcement. These things combined will greatly aid in policing the community and handling community concerns within the neighborhoods.




New Co-Director Appointed to Senior Center

We recently completed a three day "Tactical Team Operations" class that was 15 hours a day for the first two days and nine-hours the third day. We were all exhausted, but we had fun. We then scheduled deployment days for the each month, where the team will target problem areas.

We also completed a four-hour "Handcuff and Subject Control" class with great success. Sauk Village and Flossmoor officers also participated in the class.

During August, there was a combined training exercise where the Glenwood and Chicago Heights police departments conducted a "Patrol Rifle" class together.

The Glenwood Police Department instituted a completely different approach to firearms training and qualifications in September. We have agreements with the Moose Lodge in Sauk Village and the Harvey Police Department to use their ranges for firearms training.

I have also developed a range staff among the ranks of Glenwood officers with plans to create a more comprehensive firearms training program.

Since my appointment here at Glenwood, our planning and work have been non-stop. Deputy Chief Paul Schmidt and myself meet in the mornings to plan our strategies and to attack the problems and projects that are before us. Believe it or not, these challenges have been well worth the effort. This has been an extremely rewarding experience.


